Context of Claret Conference 2025

The contemporary literary landscape has been profoundly reshaped by new media, internet culture, artificial intelligence, climate change, shifting political landscapes, and post- pandemic realities. Literature is no longer confined to traditional print formats; it now thrives in digital spaces, interactive fiction, transmedia storytelling, AI-generated narratives, streaming platforms, and online literary communities. These transformations have not only altered the way stories are told but also redefined authorship, readership, publishing, and literary criticism in significant ways.

Scholars have explored how the digital turn in literature has redefined textuality and narrative structures, leading to the rise of hypertext fiction, social media literature, and participatory storytelling. Digital platforms have also democratized literary spaces, allowing diverse voices to challenge traditional publishing gatekeepers, while artificial intelligence continues to reshape creative processes, raising questions about authorship, originality, and ethical concerns in AI-generated fiction.

At the same time, literature continues to engage with socio-political upheavals, climate change, technological

advancements, and global crises. The pandemic reinforced themes of isolation, resilience, and the digital transformation of cultural consumption, influencing contemporary works across genres. Furthermore, the emergence of post humanism, digital archives, and algorithm-driven storytelling has added new dimensions to the relationship between literature and technology.

This conference, organized by the Department of English at St. Claret College Autonomous, seeks to explore how contemporary literature engages with and is shaped by new media, artificial intelligence, and the digital transformation of literary culture. In conclusion, contemporary scholarship continues to deepen our understanding of life narratives by foregrounding the constructed nature of the self, the role of memory, and the amplification of marginalized voices. This interdisciplinary approach enriches our appreciation of autobiographical writing as a dynamic and engaging field of study, with implications for broader discussions on identity, representation, and social justice.

Subthemes

Internet Culture and Literary Expression: The influence of memes, viral storytelling, digital dialects, and online literary communities.

Post-Pandemic Literature and Cultural Shifts: Themes of inequality, resilience, and digital transformation in contemporary fiction and cultural industries.

Digital Platforms as Literary Spaces: The rise of self-publishing, social media literature, and the transformation of readership.

Cinema, Streaming, and Literary Adaptations: The relationship between literature, film, web series, and trans media storytelling in the digital age.

Political and Social Change in Contemporary Literature: Protest literature, climate fiction, feminist and queer narratives, and literature's role in activism.

The Transformation of Publishing and Readership: Crowdfunding, subscription models, and algorithm-driven literary markets.

Archiving and Digital Literary Memory: The challenges of preserving digital-born literature, hyper text fiction, and ephemeral online texts.

Speculative Fiction and Genre Literature: Science fiction, fantasy, horror, and dystopian literature in response to contemporary anxieties.

Guidelines for Paper Presentation

- The paper should be in MS Word format, Times New Roman, 12 font size with 1.25 spacing and 1.0-inch margin on all sides.
- All papers must be sent to lumos@claretcollege.edu.in
- The paper must have the name of the author(s), affiliation of the author(s), and communication address with contact number and e-mail id.
- Paper should have a title and an abstract not exceeding 300 words, (Italics, Bold, 10 Point) keywords 4-5.
- The length of the paper should not exceed 3000 words including all references, tables and figures.
- Authors are expected to cite all references in MLA-8 format only.
- The maximum number of authors allowed per paper is two. Each author has to register separately.
- It is mandatory that all the paper presenters from Bengaluru must come to the venue of the conference and present it offline. Participants from outside Bengaluru can present virtually if they wish to do so.
- The research paper needs to be the original work of the author(s). They should be exclusively written for the conference and should not have been published or sent for publication elsewhere.
- Softcopy of abstract with full papers should carry the presentation in PowerPoint format (Maximum of 10 slides) along with hard copy of the full paper on the day of the conference.
- The time limit for the presentation for each paper is 10 mins. (8 Mins (actual presentation) & 2 mins (Q & A)).

Best Paper Award

Best Paper Award is given to that one paper which brings new critical perspectives to the field in terms of conceptual development or methods. To be eligible for this award, the paper must be submitted before April 25, 2025 and should be presented at the Conference -2025.

Best Paper UG – Rs 3,000/-

Best Paper PG – Rs 3,000/-

Papers can be presented online. The conference will be in hybrid mode
