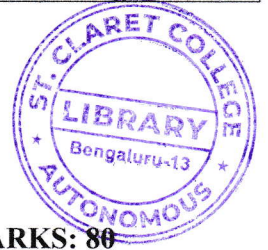

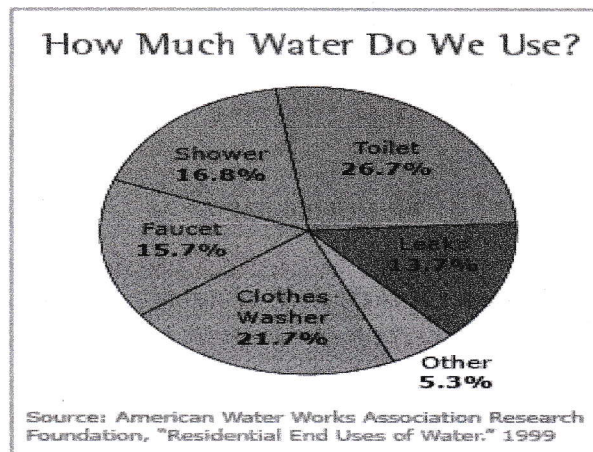

It is the thoughtful examination of the forces that have shaped the courses of human life. We can examine events from the past and then draw inferences about current events.
